From the song "Great are You Lord" by Casting Crowns, I would sing the line "It's your breath in MY lungs" while begging Jesus to take the pain and panic away. And He did. Was it fast or immediate? No, it took four years. I learned a lot in those years, not from words of wisdom from other Christians, but from Jesus. You are able to cast your cares on him when you feel like that's all you can do. He does care, He is there, and He is faithful.

Psalm 63:8 My soul clings to you; your right hand upholds me.

You know that sports fan—the one who knows every detail of their favorite player. They know all their stats, the high school they went to, their injuries, who they play best with, even their favorite food. They feel like they know that person. They will stand in line for hours for an autograph or cry when they meet them in person. Now, imagine that player's best friend—the person who has been through life with them, who knows their struggles, who walked beside them when their grandparent passed, who is on speed dial when they need someone to cry to. That friend isn't watching from the sidelines; they are fully invested in the relationship.

In our faith, we face the same choice. Will we be a fan of Jesus, admiring Him from afar, knowing the details, and being able to recite them? Or will we be a close follower who clings to Him, pursuing a personal relationship and experiencing the gritty, real details a friend so deeply committed that they can grow and share life with Him on a level a fan could never experience?

Psalm 63:8 says, "My soul clings to you." This describes someone fully devoted and committed to Jesus—not just someone on the sidelines. It's not a person checking off a box out of habit or obligation but someone clinging to Him with their whole heart. Pursuing Jesus isn't something that can be forced or done halfway; it is a personal choice. For many, the idea of following Him may feel like something we do because we were told to, because we were raised in the church, or because we prayed a prayer someone once said we should. But the difference between a fan and a follower is a choice—a choice God has given us to make. A fan admires from a distance, cheers because others are, and gets caught up in the moment. A follower, on the other hand, chooses to walk closely with Jesus and pursue Him daily.

Facing a Giant Called Fear

1 John 4:4 You, dear children, are from God and have overcome them, because the one who is in you is greater than the one who is in the world.

We live in very unusual times! With all these unusual events happening around us we may be carrying our own secret fears – maybe fear of failure, fear of not fitting in, fear of not mattering, or a fear of losing a loved one. Fear itself is NOT sinful. Fear is like an internal warning system that alerts us when there is potential danger in our lives. However, fear can lead to sin. "Then they asked him, 'What must we do to do the works God requires?' Jesus answered, 'The work of God is this; to believe in the one he has sent.'" Believe because of the signs.

"For unto us a child is born, to us a son is given," is the cry of the prophet Isaiah. "Behold, the virgin will conceive, and bear a son, and shall be called Immanuel." "But," the prophet speaks, "but he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was on him, and by his wounds we are healed."

So they asked him, "What sign then will you give that we may see it and believe you? What will you do? Our ancestors ate manna in the wilderness; as it is written: "He gave them bread from heaven to eat." Jesus said to them, "Very truly I tell you, it is not Moses who has given you bread from heaven, but it is my Father who gives you the bread from heaven. For the bread of God is the bread that comes down from heaven and gives life to the world."

"I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never go hungry, and whoever believes will never be thirsty. [...] Very truly I tell you, the one who believes has eternal life. I am the bread of life. Your ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness, yet they died. But here is the bread of life that comes down from heaven, which anyone may eat and not die. I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Whoever eats this bread will live forever. This bread is my flesh, which I will give for the life of the world." John 6:29-33, 35, 47-51

Christmas is about Jesus who comes down from heaven to a wooden manger and a wooden cross to bring himself to us. His broken body is food for our souls and healing to our bodies. 20 But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. **21** She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus,[f] because he will save his people from their sins."

22 All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet: **23** "The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel" (which means "God with us").

24 When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife. **25** But he did not consummate their marriage until she gave birth to a son. And he gave him the name Jesus.

A Theology of Wonder

Psalm 8

He decreed statues for Jacob and established the law in Israel, which he commanded our ancestors to teach their children, so the next generation would know them, even the children yet to be born, and they, in turn, would tell their children.

Grandparents hold a unique and treasured role in the family, a position filled with love, wisdom, and experience. As we reflect on our journey, it's essential to acknowledge the significance of the legacy we are creating for the next generation. In Psalm 78, we are reminded of the importance of sharing our faith and the goodness of experiences--those moments where you witnessed God's provision, love, and grace. These anecdotes not only enrich your grandchildren's understanding of the world but also help them see the hand of God in everyday life. As a grandparent, you have the unique opportunity to influence your grandchildren spiritually. Share with them not just the lessons from your life, but also the lessons from Scripture. Introduce them to Bible stories, teach them how to pray, and encourage them to seek God in their own live. Your relationship with them can be a bridge that connects them to their faith in a meaningful way.

Take sometime this week to share a story or a lesson from your life with your grandchildren. Whether it's a joyful memory, a challenge you faced, or a time when you felt God's presence, let them see how your faith has shaped you. You might also consider starting a new tradition, like reading a Bible story together or having prayer time, to foster spiritual growth in your family.

The podcast had a pastor speaking who mentioned this verse. The pastor noted how when looking at this verse contextually, it may have a slightly different meaning. In the time period in which this passage was written, salt would have been used more so for preservation, rather than to season your food. Preservation. The Merriam-Webster dictionary describes it as, "..the activity or process of keeping something valued alive, intact, or free from damage or decay." This painted this verse in a different light for me. I can watch the way I say things, of course, but do I have the self-control within myself to speak in a way that preserves my relationship with others? More importantly, am I speaking to others in a way that will preserve the potential to lead them into a relationship with Christ? Are we speaking to our difficult family members, strangers, and friends with the intention of preservation? With the holiday season guickly approaching, and interactions with our not-so-favorite family members in near view, I pray I remember the reason for the season, and speak in grace, love, and salt.

Prayer: Lord, keep me mindful of my intentions when speaking to others. I only want to lift You up, and see You glorified. When feelings of bitterness and resentment bubble up, let me speak only of preservation, grace, and love. Thank you for being the perfect example of that. Amen
